
beloved pets when their time comes."

The veterinarian only starts the euthanasia process when everyone is ready. This helps bring closure to all family members involved in the end-of-life care of a pet. For those who need support with aftercare, the veterinarian can assist with transportation and cremation services.

In-home Pet Euthanasia Costs

The starting price of in-home euthanasia starts at \$300 in the Mid-Willamette Valley. The aftercare and cremation price begins at \$93 and varies depending on factors such as the driving distance, the pet's size, and the option for private or communal cremation.
